CPPs – Updates Required

- CPPs must be updated to meet State requirements:
 - Housing planning (HB1220) addressing affordability, equity, and antidisplacement
 - Climate planning (HB 1181) addressing climate resilience
- CPPs should be updated to meet local goals:
 - Align with current vision and priorities
 - Address departmental needs and remove outdated policies
 - Provide opportunities for greater interagency collaboration

Key Changes in Recommendation

- Exploration of Union as a new UGA
- Consider UGA co-management with City of Shelton
- Multimodal transportation access/network
- Strengthen affordable housing policies and incorporate antidisplacement
- Strengthen resource industries policies
- Integrate climate resilience and hazard mitigation information

Progress to Date

May

• Draft updates submitted for Planning Department review

Jun

• Interdepartmental review and updates

Jul

- Intergency review and updates (Shelton, school districts, fire districts, Tribes, and others)
- Draft CPPs finalized and circulated for planning purposes

Aug

• Revised CPPs adopted (tentative)

- HB1220 requires consideration of equity and addressing historic disparities. How should Mason County:
 - Prioritize equity in land use and transportation policies?
 - Prioritize equity in capital facilities and parks/open space investments?
- HB1220 requires consideration of displacement risk for low-income households. How should Mason County support stability for these community members?

Preliminary Housing Allocations

Housing Type	Shelton (City & UGA)	Belfair & Allyn UGAs	Other Rural County	Total Need	Housing Share
Single Family Detached	1,163	816	352	2,330	33%
Multi-Family (2+ units per structure)	1,542	1,275	148	2,996	42%
Manufactured Homes, Cottages, ADUs	177	265	1,324	1,765	35%
Total Housing Units	2,882	2,356	1,824	7,061	100%
Estimated Capture of Housing Need	41%	33%	26%	100%	
Projected Population Increase	6,835	5,600	1,235	13,670	

- Based on OFM's medium-growth projection
- Uses Commerce methodology refined with local conditions information
- Does not consider a Union UGA
- Subject to additional refinement as analysis and interagency discussions continue

- Preliminary housing allocations place most growth in UGAs, consistent with State requirements
 - Shelton receives 41% unit allocations
 - Belfair/Allyn UGAs receive 33% unit allocations
 - Rural county receives 26% unit allocations, primarily SFR and other detached units
- Most affordable housing likely to be served by multifamily units primarily in Shelton and UGAs



Community Survey

- Opened 6/4
- 107 responses to date
- Primarily online, paper surveys offered if needed

- Primarily long-tenured residents (>20yrs)
- Typically older residents
- Typically retired
- Often higher-income, or no income info provided

• How can you support the survey?

- What makes Mason County great:
 - Rural atmosphere and natural beauty/resources
 - Small community with strong social connections
 - Low population with good access to services and larger cities
- What Mason County needs:
 - More amenities, services, retail, and job opportunities
 - Environmental protection/conservation and tourism
 - Reduce crime
 - More affordable housing choices
 - Improve infrastructure

- General planning priorities should be:
 - Maintaining a safe community
 - Preserving and reinforcing Mason County's northwest woodland character
 - Providing more parks and recreation opportunities
 - Keeping the community engaged in local issues

- Housing priorities:
 - Affordability
 - Range of choices
 - Mixed-use options (in urban areas)
 - Single-family homes
 - "Middle housing," i.e., medium-density units consistent with scale and form of single-family homes

• Climate concern: typically very concerned

• Climate preparedness: Mason County needs to take more action

- Critical risks:
 - Extreme weather events
 - Drought and water scarcity
 - Heatwaves and urban heat is land effect
 - Sea level rise
